## **ABSTRACT**

The practice of precooling, or reducing core temperature ( $T_c$ ), improves exercise performance by starting the body at a cooler temperature, thereby enabling an athlete to increase their heat storage and perform more work prior to reaching a limiting  $T_c$ . **Purpose**: To observe the effects of various precooling and warm-up combinations on 5km time trial performance as well as to develop an ideal method of standardization to reduce performance variability within the time trial. **Methods**: Seven highly-trained male endurance runners completed a familiarization trial, as well as four trials consisting of different combinations of a 10-minute warm-up, 30-minute precool by cold water immersion ( $24 \pm 1^{\circ}$ C) or 30 minutes of sitting. Each pretreatment condition was then followed by a 5km time trial treadmill run.
